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An Introduction to the ISSP

The International Social Survey Programme

The ISSP is a continuing annual programme of cross-national collaboration on surveys covering topics important for social science research. It brings together pre-existing social science projects and coordinates research goals, thereby adding a cross-national, cross-cultural perspective to the individual national studies. Twenty-six countries are members of the ISSP.

It started late in 1983 when SCPR, London, secured funds from the Nuffield Foundation to hold meetings to further international collaboration between four existing surveys - the General Social Survey, conducted by NORC in the USA, the British Social Attitudes Survey, conducted by SCPR in Great Britain, the Allgemeine Bevölkerungsumfrage der Sozialwissenschaften, conducted by ZUMA in West Germany and the National Social Science Survey, conducted by ANU in Australia. Prior to this, NORC and ZUMA had been collaborating bilaterally since 1982 on a common set of questions.

The four founding members agreed to (1) jointly develop modules dealing with important areas of social science, (2) field the modules as a fifteen-minute supplement to the regular national surveys (or a special survey if necessary), (3) include an extensive common core of background variables and (4) make the data available to the social science community as soon as possible.

Each research organisation funds all of its own costs. There are no central funds. The merging of the data into a cross-national data set is performed by the Zentralarchiv für Empirische Sozialforschung, University of Cologne.

Since 1984, the ISSP has grown to 26 nations: the founding four - Australia, Germany, Great Britain and the United States - plus Austria, Bulgaria, Canada, Cyprus, the Czech Republic, France, Hungary, Israel, Ireland, Italy, Japan, the Netherlands, New Zealand, Norway, the Philippines, Poland, Portugal, Russia, the Slovakian Republic, Slovenia, Spain and Sweden.

The annual topics for the ISSP are developed over several years by a sub-committee and are pre-tested in various countries. The annual plenary meeting of the ISSP then adopts the final questionnaire. ISSP questions need to be relevant to all countries and expressed in an equivalent manner in all languages. The questionnaire is originally drafted in British English and then translated into other languages.

The ISSP marks several new departures in the area of cross-national research. First, the collaboration between organisations is not ad hoc or intermittent, but routine and continual. Second, while necessarily more circumscribed than collaboration dedicated solely to cross-national research on a single topic, the ISSP makes cross-national research a basic part of the national research agenda of each participating country. Third, by combining a cross-time with a cross-national perspective, two powerful research designs are being used to study societal processes.

Sample type: Panel of respondents from the ISSS/A 1993 'Inequality II' survey, which was in turn a panel on the earlier National Social Science Survey 'Family' and 'Lifestyles' surveys, conducted in late 1989 and early 1990 (from which the socio-demographic background variables for the 1993-94 data are taken). The sample for the 1989-90 surveys was a nationwide simple random sample drawn from the (compulsory) Australian electoral rolls by the Australian Electoral Commission. Potential respondents were eligible for inclusion in the 1993-94 survey if they had completed the 1993 survey, had not indicated that they did not wish to participate further and were still contactable at the same address.

Sample type:

The sampling model used is that of a two-stage cluster sample. It is representative for the population of Bulgaria aged 18 years and over. At the first stage 105 clusters (which represent the smallest organizational units of the latest population census - December 1992) were selected at random with probability proportional to their size (the number of households in each cluster). At the second stage territorial areas (streets and apartment houses) within each cluster were selected at random; 12 addresses were sequentially visited. In each household 1 respondent was interviewed; respondents were selected employing a modified Kish scheme.

The sample is stratified by type of community. No replacements of temporary absent or refusing to participate respondents were allowed

Fieldwork methods:

The method employed is face-to-face interview. Fieldwork was conducted by the field-force of the Agency for Social Analyses, Sofia. All interviewers employed have undergone the necessary training and have considerable fieldwork experience.

Weighting procedure: There are no indications for systematic bias in survey data. However, comparisons with general population data revealed the necessity of weighting. The weighting-factor is calculated using data from the 2% sample of the Census of December 1992 and is based on age, sex, education and type of community. Comparisons between population data, net survey sample and weighted sample show that only minor deviations "remain" in survey data after the weighting procedure.

Sample type: Stratified Multi-stage Random Sample*Fieldwork methods:* Self-completion with drop-off and collection*Sampling method:* A stratified multi-stage sampling method was employed using as the primary strata for the five main regions: Atlantic Canada, Quebec, Ontario, Western Canada and British Columbia. Within these regions major sub-areas were randomly selected from Federal Electoral Districts.

Eastern Canada: St. Johns, Newfoundland, St. John, New Brunswick, Halifax, Nova Scotia, Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island

Quebec: Quebec East, Hull/Aylmer, St. Honore/Westmount

Ontario: Ottawa East, Mississauga North, Kingston and the Islands

Western Canada: St. Boniface, Manitoba, Regina East, Saskatchewan, Calgary West, Alberta

Within each of these districts two Enumeration Areas were randomly selected. Using Census maps the first two streets that began with the letter F and S and contained more than 50 residential units were then chosen resulting in a total of 64 sampling frames. Interviewers were instructed to divide the number of residences on any given street by the number of sample points required. In-home sampling used the "first birthday" technique.

Weighting procedure:

The Canadian data is weighted for both precision and stratification. In the case of the former data, is routinely weighted for age and sex. In the case of stratification the weighting applies to province. Since the Provinces' populations vary enormously the sampling method is a stratified random sample, stratified by region. This is done to ensure representation from the smallest regions, such as the Atlantic - Newfoundland, Nova Scotia, PEI, Bew Brunswick - wich accounts for only 12% of the Canadian population. Weighting for province restores the true population distribution. This would be unnecessary if provincial variance was marginal, but for almost all social and political indicators in Canada, province or region are critical measures. Due to stratification by province, the data are weighted for age, sex and province using 1991 Statistics Canada census parameters.

Sample type: Stratified random probability. The sample is designed to be representative of adults aged 18 or over living in private accommodation in Great Britain. It was drawn from the Postcode Address File (PAF) which is a list of addresses compiled by the Post Office. The sampling method involved a multi-stage design: first a number of postcode sectors were selected with probability proportionate to the number of addresses in each sector. A number of addresses were then selected in each sector by starting from a random point on the list of addresses for each sector and choosing each address at a fixed interval. Finally when interviewers called at the addresses, they selected one dwelling unit and one respondent at the selected dwelling unit using a Kish grid.

Fieldwork methods: Self-completion supplement given to respondents after the face-to-face interview. The supplement was either collected by the interviewer or posted back to the office.

Study title: Family and Changing Sex Roles

Sample type:

The sample was a "fresh" one, drawn from the post-election study including 1500 respondents. Sample drawing was different compared to TARKI's earlier method because files at the Population Register Bureau, we used formerly, were not available anymore as a consequence of the new Law by the Constitutional Court on Personal Rights. Still, sample drawing was a random procedure and samples were selected in three stages based on files from Hungarian Central Statistical Office. First, a cluster of settlements were selected and second households within the cities and villages. There was no possibility to select individuals, Central Statistical Office could provide only "addresses of households". Thus interviewers have received "addresses without names" and the third stage of sample drawing was to select the respondent within the household. This was done by the interviewer with help of Leslie Kish key after the number of people as well as the number of men was clarified in the selected household.

The Central Statistical Office provided substitute "addresses" that were used instead of those that could not be achieved. Thus the final number of achieved interviews remained 1500.

Still it is known that 463 of 1500 (30.8%) interviews from the original sample has failed and was substituted.

Fieldwork methods: Personal interviews by trained interviewers.

Context of ISSP questionnaire:

The ISSP94 Module was fielded as part of TARKI's post-election survey. Thus, the fieldwork was scheduled immediately after the elections. The questionnaire was designed in a way that the ISSP questions were placed in the beginning of the interview. Optional questions were not included. The ISSP questions were followed by questions on participation on the elections and voting for the parties. Questions on the respondent and background information were at the end of the questionnaire.

Comments on labour force status and education

The NSD data are compared with data from the Norwegian Labour Force Surveys (LFS). The LFS are conducted every month with a gross sample of about 10000 persons aged 16-74 years. The aim of the LFS is to watch the development in the labour market and to estimate the composition of the population with respect to labour force participation and main activity. In the LFS members of the labour force are defined as people

1. who have some sort of paid work or are drafted in military service (the questions tapping this aspect are identical in the LFS and the NSD surveys);
2. who work in family business;
3. who are temporarily out of work (e.g. sick, laid off).

From the NSD background variable questions we are able to construct a labour force status variable which is a good comparison with the LFS data. There might be a small uncertainty about people who are temporarily out of work and for some reason answer that they don't have paid work. Since the Central Bureau of Statistics uses a combination of telephone and personal interviewing in the LFS, we also believe that the Central Bureau achieves relative higher response rates among marginal social groups. The construction of comparable education variables is more uncertain, and the data should be interpreted with great care.
